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**The Montessori approach+Crone-i**

In Montessori schools, the program is so far from "one-size-fits-all" education that even grade levels are flexible, grouped by developmental range instead of chronological age. This allows children to learn at their own pace, and the classroom instruction is structured in such a way that students are able to complete tasks before moving on, giving them a sense of accomplishment.

In her 1915 address to the National Education Association, Doctor Maria Montessori recounted a story of a three-year-old student who was deeply absorbed in a wooden block activity. Montessori stated that she had never seen a look of such "fixedness," as the child worked on the activity, repeating it more than forty times.

Maria Montessori was a pioneer of early childhood education, working at the beginning of the 20th century to develop care and education for preschool children in Italy.

**The Montessori approach – THE EDUCATION HUB**

The Montessori Method is an approach to education which emphasizes individuality and independence in learning. Children are seen as inherently curious and learning driven. Thus, education is viewed as a process which should occur in harmony with the child's individual developmental pace.
